# Post-Procedural Sedation Patient Discharge Instructions

### What to expect:

- 1. You may feel sick to your stomach after sedation or after you take your pain medication.
- 2. The area around the intravenous site on your arm will be sore. The soreness will go away in a few days.
- 3. A slight fever after sedation is normal. If your temperature is higher than 101 degrees F, call your doctor.
- 4. You can take pain medications as ordered by your doctor.
- 5. You can take other medications that you usually take, unless your doctor tells you otherwise.

#### **Driving:**

- 1. A responsible individual must drive you home when you are discharged from the hospital. A bus driver or cabdriver is not a responsible caregiver.
- 2. Do not drive immediately after the procedure. You may drive the day after your procedure.

#### **Activities:**

- 1. You may feel dizzy and sleepy after your surgery. When you get home, you should rest and only move as much as you can without getting tired.
- 2. We suggest that a responsible individual stay with you after your procedure and overnight.
- 3. You may not return to work or operate machinery or power tools for the rest of the day that you get home.
- 4. Do not make any important decisions or sign important papers for the rest of the day.
- 5. Children should not ride bikes or skateboards, play on gym sets, etc., for the rest of the day.

#### Diet:

- 1. You can return to your regular diet after your surgery.
- 2. Do not drink alcoholic beverages, including beer and wine, for the rest of the day.
- 3. Do not take sleeping pills or any other psychotropic (nerve) medications for the rest of the day. The combination of alcohol / sleeping pills and anesthesia / sedation that will still be present in your body can have harmful side effects.
