Personal Letter Prompts

Please use the questions below to guide your letter of interest.

Part One (350 words suggested)

- Tell us about yourself and what experiences (e.g., personal, community, academic, etc.), skills, strengths, and/or perspectives you would bring to psychiatry.
- What patient care and/or lived experiences have shaped your path toward choosing psychiatry?
- How have you been informed by or contributed to social justice, equity, and/or engagement with marginalized communities within or beyond medicine? Or how do you see yourself contributing to these issues in the future?

Part Two (350 words suggested)

• From your multiple experiences (e.g., academic, community, personal, etc.), what are some of the notable gaps or challenges in psychiatry you've seen? What is your vision for the future of psychiatry to address these?

These questions were developed by the CaRMs Service User Committee, a diverse group of people with lived experience of mental health and substance use issues who have been involved in resident selection within the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Toronto since 2016. Recognizing that patients are diversely situated and face myriad challenges that intersect with their mental health/addictions (e.g., poverty, racism), we value applicants who have developed a holistic approach to health and wellbeing that attends to oppression, equity and the social determinants of health. Similarly we recognize and value that medical students come from diverse identities, backgrounds, and life experiences and that these unique personal, academic, and community experiences will inform their approach to psychiatric care.
