Co-Presidents	Develop and uphold KDSAP's vision and mission; ensure that the executive board functions smoothly and effectively; and objectively evaluate KDSAP's performance and identify actions necessary for improvement
Secretary	Take minutes at board meetings; update the KDSAP website; organize board/club retreats, socials, and informational sessions
Treasurer	Formulate the annual budget; apply for grants; maintain KDSAP's bank account; reimburse board members for expenses; organize fundraising events
Directors of Community Outreach	Organize community publicity efforts prior to health screenings; collaborate with community health screening partners; manage screenings; research and propose new communities that KDSAP could reach out to in the future
Directors of Health Education	Research and create health education presentations on kidney function, kidney disease, treatment, etc.; devise a curriculum and organize health education talks; organize and uphold the mentoring program between undergraduates and high school students; structure workshops tailored to high school students' needs
Directors of Programming	Foster and cultivate students' and KDSAP members' interest in nephrology and health-care fields by organizing on-campus events; arrange shadowing opportunities with nephrologists for undergraduates; and organize the semesterly Universal Precaution and Professionalism workshop and blood-pressure training
Freshman Publicity Manager	Increase KDSAP's visibility on-campus and within the community by publicizing KDSAP events and representing KDSAP at various activity fairs; lead recruitment efforts directed towards the incoming freshman class
